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Latvia Churches Celebrate 90/20 Years

Annual Conference and 90/20 Celebration Report

The Annual Conference of the Latvia United Methodist Church (LAMB) was opened at Camp Wesley August 25, 2011, by Bishop Christian Alstead who presided throughout the conference. The afternoon session was highlighted by the reports of the pastors of the individual congregations. The evening worship service was held at the Matras Church, which is the closest congregation to Wesley Camp. The worship service included some very inspired singing particularly that of Wesley Rouse of the Fairview UMC in Maryville, TN. The sermon by Dr. Jerry Russell, also of Fairview UMC, was very well received by those in attendance. Following the sermon, Bishop Alstead and pastor Edgars Sneiders led the service of Holy Communion.

The business session of the conference took up most of the day on Saturday. The reports covered many of the programs

and services offered by LAMB including Wesley Camp and the Hope Center. The financial report was presented by the new accountant as well as the proposed budget for the next year. The closing remarks by Bishop Alstead were challenging and thought provoking.

On June 22 a Volunteers In Mission Team of eight arrived at Wesley Camp with the hope of completing the first tent platform/cabin/bunkhouse. The team consisted of Drs. John Morrison and Jan Hudson from University United Methodist Church in Baton Rouge, LA; Mr. Richard (Bud) Vann from First UMC in Winter Park, FL; Mrs. Cindi Wright from White Springs UMC, in Fayette, AL; Lynn Marie Smith and Shane Fair, from Hannah UMC in Gordo, AL; and Jim Shepherd and Joe Acker from FUMC in Fayette, AL. Joe Acker was the team leader.

The platform was placed on the edge of the apple orchard near the rear of the old garage which is located behind the Holston House. It is approximately 19' square, sits on a very strong footing, 12" by 12" with double re-bars in order to support the eventual cabin/bunkhouse which will be built on it. The foundation is made of two layers of concrete blocks. This allows for plenty of clearance during the heavy rainy season and the winter snows. The framing consisted of treated and untreated lumber purchased locally. A combination of 2" X 6" and 2" X 8" lumber was used to frame the deck/floor. The deck, which will become the sub-floor for the cabin/bunkhouse is made of treated 1" X 8" planks. (All dimensions are approximate equivalents to metric dimensions.)



Although the process was hindered by delayed deliveries and threatening rain, it was completed by Friday, July 1. Weather forecasts predicted 60% chance of rain Wednesday through Friday. It rained all three days in the nearby area but did not rain at Wesley Camp until late Friday, approximately two hours after the project was completed. The team was scheduled to leave on Saturday morning July 2. The accompanying pictures show various stages of the process and the

In addition to building the platform, the team cut some grass and helped to erect the large tent which was given to Wesley Camp by the Danish UMC. The tent will be utilized during the annual conference of the Latvia Methodist church in August. The team also worshiped with the Liepaja, Riga, and Cesis congregations and delivered handmade blankets to the Hope Center.



The team wishes to express its appreciation to Kristine Vainovska for logistical support, Romans Budnika for help in purchasing materials and working on the platform, and to the youth from Latvia and Lithuania who helped on the project.

A second platform is scheduled to be built at Wesley Camp by a team from Tullahoma, TN in August. This team will also place a drop-in ceiling in the dining hall in the Alabama Building.

I find it amazing that I am counted among the privileged to be able to hear the stories and visit with the young girls in Latvia that are choosing to give birth to their children and participating in the Hope Center ministry. God is good to touch these lives and thereby touch ours as well. Doing so is not necessarily choosing the easiest or simplest path for their lives. Yet, the beaming faces and the life evident in the lives of the children speak volumes to the blessings and returns that this ministry is receiving.

The skills learned and the nurturing in a comfortable environment has done much to stir hope in them that life is worth the living. Beyond the training and practical life skills, the girls are learning what it is to serve others outside their nuclear family. They have the opportunity to engage in Bible study, worship and have served the greater church by providing hospitality to pastors and lay leaders gathering in District meetings.

I asked my own Sunday school class(es) here in the US what HOPE means to them. Many tie it to Faith. The Apostle Paul agrees with them writing such verses as 1Cor 13:13 and Romans 5:1-5. HOPE is intimately connected with FAITH which understands that we rejoice in the hope of glory of God, meaning that we have an expectation to see and experience the glory of God personally. What a marvelous thought!

I've wondered at times, how is it that these young ladies have so much HOPE. Many have come through such

difficult circumstances to get to this place. I find my answer in the scripture in Romans. For Paul tells us that through tribulation, perseverance is produced, in perseverance character is realized and character expresses itself in HOPE. And Paul continues reminding us that "Hope does not disappoint."



God is good to provide such blessings through trials. Yet, the question remains, whose hands will our God use to minister and nurture these and future girls in this ministry? Are your hands available? Are you busy right now? Much has been done for numbers of these girls and much is still yet to do. Thursday afternoon was spent with the Liepa Hope Center staff, moms and their baby boys.



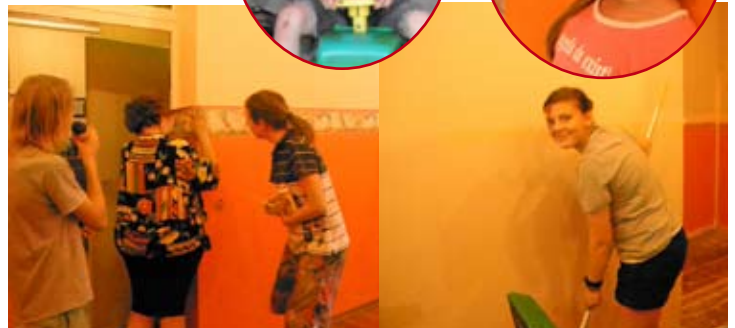
It was decided that we would replace the flooring and paint the Bambi Room at Riga 1st. The room is used as an outreach during the week providing childcare for working moms.

Bambi Room June 13, 2011

Dear Friends,

In 2006 the Southwest District of the North Alabama Conference began a program of providing vitamins for the elderly in Latvia. We have sustained that program through these years with major assistance one year from Fairview in Maryville. For the last three years the Hannah church with our help has provided the funds for this program which has grown significantly. For each of these years the amount of USD provided has been \$7,000. Hannah provided the funds and the vitamins were purchased locally in Riga.

Last year, knowing that we would not be at Hannah after the winter of 2010-2011, we tried to involve the district again in this project but met with very limited success. This year I have been praying and searching for an answer as to a source of funding for the vitamin program and have not been able to find an answer. When I was in Latvia in August, I discussed this with Gita M. and we agreed that I should let the FOL leadership know that I am no longer in a position to lead in the raising of funds for this program.

The scope of this important work can be seen in the report made at annual conference by the leader of Dia-

conal work in LAMB, Vera Titovica, pastor of the Liepa Russian congregation. It reads:

"During Christmas we continued our Vitamin project led by Joe Acker and Hannah church who provided the necessary funds for us to buy and distribute 600 m. (monthly) doses of children' vitamins, 440 m. doses of adult vitamins, 680 m. doses of vitamins for seniors, 150 m. doses of Calcium pills and 50 m. doses of fish oil. It was all distributed during Christmas time. We cannot express how much it meant for the people in our churches, especially, in the countryside congregations where people are sometimes struggling to buy food, not mentioning vitamins. ..."

My prayer is that someone will step forward to continue this vital health maintenance program.

A recent business trip to Eastern Europe gave me an opportunity to reconnect with our friends in the Latvian UMC and check in on some “seeds” planted during my first trip to Latvia two years ago. In July 2009, I led a mission team to Wesley Camp to assist with one of the summer camps for children. This year, I was able to “piggyback” on a business trip so I could spend the weekend of June 10-12 catching up with friends in Riga.

When I arrived on a Friday afternoon, I found Rev. Gita Mednis, District Superintendent for Latvia and pastor of Riga First United Methodist Church (UMC), overseeing the repainting and re-flooring of the nursery room at Riga First. Gita visited my home church, Good Shepherd UMC in Waldorf, MD, in May 2010, to share with our congregation some of her experiences about the ways God is working to bring healing and wholeness to the people of Latvia through the UMC and other churches.

It was great to catch up with Gita and to meet Jim and Dana Nance, who were helping finish up the renovation work in the Bambi Room, but I had another purpose in making the trip. I wanted to reinvigorate the puppet ministry we helped start during our summer 2009 mission trip. That year, the mission team from Good Shepherd (Rev. Steve Larsen, his daughter Emma, Alina Busch, my daughter Sarah and me) spent a week at Wesley Camp where we made friends and shared our faith in Christ with some of the nearly 150 young people at there. Sarah and I also taught several volunteers how to use puppets in Christian ministry.



We started with the basics and taught in English. (I still remember how odd it was to say my lines, puppet in hand, and wait for the translation before the next character could speak). By the end of the camp, however, the six young people we worked with performed a sketch in Latvian at the worship service that closed out the camp. That was a powerful affirmation that with God’s help, we had planted some seeds for a puppet ministry to take root in Latvia.

My goal for this year’s visit was to “water the seeds,” so to speak, by sharing more about how the puppets could be used during worship. I had several e-mail exchanges with Kristine Vainovska prior to my trip to work out what we could accomplish in three days. Kristine is a tremendously talented servant of Christ who has a passion for drama. She is also tremendously gifted in working with youth and young adults.

Kristine invited several youth to come to the church Friday afternoon to work with the puppets. Six young people answered the call. I was delighted to see among the group two of the puppeteers we had trained at Wesley Camp two years before—Karlis Ozols and Simona Vainovska. Friday afternoon

and evening we worked on the fundamentals of puppetry. On Saturday we made signs for the song we would perform during Sunday’s worship service. Kristine translated a sketch I wrote for a talent show at La Plata UMC in Maryland into Latvian. The song was still in English but Kristine translated the lyrics into Latvian and put them into a powerpoint show for the service.

Sunday evening came and it was time for the puppets to go on. So how did they do? They were terrific! The sketch went off very smoothly and the song was loads of fun. The puppeteers did a good job making their characters come to life. All the signs went up at the right time in the song too—no small feat for any puppet team. I even had a walk-on role at the end of the sketch as a stern school principal. Thankfully, my only job was to clear my throat and look serious. I think that translates into just about any language.

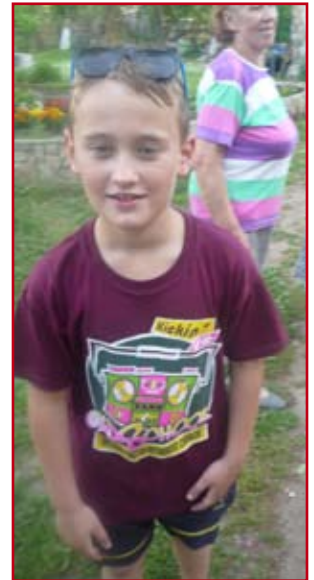

On Monday, June 20 a group of twelve tearful and tired Latvian friends departed from the McGee-Tyson Knoxville Airport to begin their return trip to Kuldiga, Latvia. Members of the Kuldiga United Methodist Church, the group arrived in Knoxville on Thursday evening, June 9 to begin their visit to the supporting congregations in Norris, Sinking Springs, Wears Valley and Maryville. Five members of the group stayed with host families in Norris and seven members stayed with host families in Maryville.

Planning for the visit began in June 2010 when a mission team from the supporting churches returned from a trip to Kuldiga. During this trip members of the Kuldiga UMC opened their hearts and homes to members of the mission team. On the return trip to Tennessee team members decided that God was calling them to invite our Kuldiga friends for a visit into our homes and hearts. Several fundraisers were sponsored by the supporting churches to pay for the airfare and expenses of the Latvian visitors.

While in Tennessee the group experienced Henderson Settlement, Habitat for Humanity, Second Harvest Food Bank, Dollywood, the Museum of Appalachia, a canoe trip down the Clinch River and attended music concerts



in Maryville, Norris and Knoxville. Group members were treated to a wide variety of foods at covered dish dinners, picnics, and cookouts. They ate meals at several area restaurants, including Cheddars, Cracker Barrel, and Calhouns.

Our guests experienced the lives of their host families and became temporary members of the families. The two Kuldiga United Methodist Church ministers were part of the group and preached at church services at First UMC, Maryville and Norris and Sinking Springs UMCs. The Kuldiga ministers visited with Holston Conference Methodist ministers and discussed ministry with youth and adults. The ministers and group participated in outreach ministries sponsored by the supporting churches and marveled that there were outreach ministries they

could begin in Kuldiga.

The First United Methodist Church in Maryville sponsored a farewell meal and church service. During the service supporting church members and our Kuldiga friends spoke about their wonderful experiences and love for each other.

Gunt and Vivita, the two Kuldiga ministers were presented



with money to purchase a cross for the Kuldiga UMC upon their return to Latvia. After many tears, hugs, and goodbyes the Latvian friends proceeded through security to await their flight back to Latvia. They left many friends in Tennessee who will miss them and long for a time when we can see them again in Latvia.

The year 2011 has brought many changes for me. The most surprising change has been going on a mission trip to Latvia from July 23rd through August 2nd. The mission trip part was not a surprise as I have been on a few of them before, however, I had never been to Europe and wasn't even sure Latvia was a country before doing more research. All I knew was that the Lord was telling me to go and so I went and took a friend from church, Lauren Sheehan, with me.

Lauren and I made connections in Latvia and visited four ministries while in Latvia. We spent time with a pastor and his wife from Ogre, visited Sparrow's Nest Orphanage, YWAM – Riga, and the Hope Center. At the Hope Center, we were able to connect with the director, Gita. Gita picked us up in Riga and it was a good thing otherwise we would have ended up in Liepaja instead of Liepa which is about 3-4 hours in the other direction as it is along the Baltic Sea. It was also good to learn a little about the Hope Center before arriving there and meeting the ladies.

When we got to the Hope Center, we were greeted by the mothers and their children. Lauren and I walked to the store with Ina, one of the mothers and her two boys. Ina was in charge of buying the groceries that day as she was going to be cooking the meals the next day. We were humbled when Ina insisted that she buy us an ice cream cone and would not take no for an answer. This describes Ina's generous and kind personality well as we would get to know her during our short stay at the Hope Center. Ina was the newest of three to be at the Hope Center as she had only been there a week. She told us that she came to the Hope Center after hearing about it through a child care her son attended in Riga. Ina was in a relationship with her son's father who was currently in jail for drug charges. Lauren and I were able to share Christ's love with Ina who had a hard time understanding the forgiveness that Christ offers. Ina attends a Jehovah Witness Church with her mother and she stated

that she did not feel welcome at the church until she "get's her act cleaned up" as she is not married to her children's father.

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Jeremiah 29:11

The journey to Latvia was one of many unexpected blessings that required trusting in the plans that the Lord had laid out before us. The idea of Latvia came as a passing thought in a time of prayer and turned into a wonderful encounter of people that we never would have met halfway around the world had we not trusted that God had something there for us.

Kristin and I started to connect with ministries in Latvia shortly after we felt that there was something pulling on our heartstrings to go there. One connection seemed to lead to another and we were blessed to be connected with Dainis and Liene Panders and their church, Ogre Trinity Baptist. Dainis and his wife Liene so selflessly drove us four hours from the airport in Tallin to their home near Ogre. The fellowship that we shared with them throughout our trip and their example of servanthood was one of the great blessings of our experience. We had an opportunity to meet with various ministries including the Sparrow's Nest Orphanage in Jalgava, Latvia. Meeting the director, Alissa Stemple, and other staff members as well as some of the children was so uplifting. The orphanage is a beautiful place that words cannot even describe, where the children are loved and cared for regardless of the circumstances that brought them there. We had an opportunity to bring some supplies we had collected in the states including school supplies, backpacks, socks and underwear for the children. Our time at the orphanage was blessed by prayer with and for the staff that their needs would continue to be met and that waiting children would find "forever families".



From there we spent some time in Riga learning about the various occupations of Latvia and what the country has overcome in their history. We connected with YWAM-Riga and some of the ministries that they are overseeing including the "Baltic Bread Project" and Freedom-61, a ministry connected to human trafficking.

I went to Cesis in June with the group from Smithfield UMC. It was my pleasure to be the storyteller for the young people during the children's Bible study. I had not done anything like this and had no idea what to expect. During the first story time, I just read the Bible passages to them along with the interpreter. They seemed to enjoy it very much. We took costumes with us so they could dress up as the Bible characters in the stories.

I discovered that they were mostly older children who could read well and many even knew English. We had taken 160 Latvian New Testaments with Psalms to the church. So, for the second story, I gave the children Bibles and had them read along with me in Latvian while I read the English translation. This seemed extra meaningful to them and I was so pleased to be able to encourage them to read the Bible for themselves. It is so important for people to form a habit of reading the Bible early in life when possible.

It is a beautiful thing to watch children open up to the Gospel of Christ. I felt so humble to be a part of this. The

children spent several hours each day at the church and were so enthusiastic about being there and taking part in the activities and Bible studies. My prayer is that they will continue to read their Bibles and grow in Grace. And, that the Methodist Church will continue to work with the congregation in Cesis.

The Annual Wesley Camp Board of Directors meeting was held at Wesley Camp on August 24-25. This was an important meeting for the Board as it presented the first real opportunity to formulate long-range plans for the camp. Previous meetings had mostly dealt with the organization and establishing the Board. Seven members of the Board were present in person and two others joined by teleconference. Unfortunately, the teleconference link was very poor and non on-site participation somewhat limited.

The meeting was begun by a tour of the camp with the Board members expressing delight at the new ceiling in the dining hall and the two "tent platforms" which were recently completed. Concerns were expressed over the condition of the trees in the orchard and certain electrical and safety issues which members of the Board pointed out.

The first major issue addressed was the official registration of the camp, a process which is very complicated under Latvian law. Members of the board from Denmark had proposed that they raise money to hire a consultant, preferably a camp director in Latvia who has led a camp through the registration process. Since the Danes have already raised the money, the Board voted to proceed with identifying an appropriate consultant and budgeted 5000 Ls to bring the camp up to code in all respects.

A second issue is the local camp leadership. The camp director, Romans Budnika, is a seaman who is home on alternate 10-week periods. His present schedule will prevent him from being present during the 2012 camping season. He has asked that we formally arrange for

an assistant to care for the camp when he is away since his wife, Inese who has been standing in for him, will be on maternity leave following the Apple Festival in September. The Board discussed several alternatives to be explored, with priority being placed on finding a local couple who could stay at the camp during camping season. If this cannot be worked out, the Board will solicit a retired couple from a supporting country to come to Camp in the early spring and stay until closing of camp in late August.

The problem of the aging orchard was addressed along with the placement of future "tent platforms." A consultant for the orchard was brought in after the meeting and offered several suggestions which will be presented to the Board executive committee. Other matters, such as parking and leveling of the ball field, were tabled pending the result of the consultation about registration of the camp and other long range-plans.

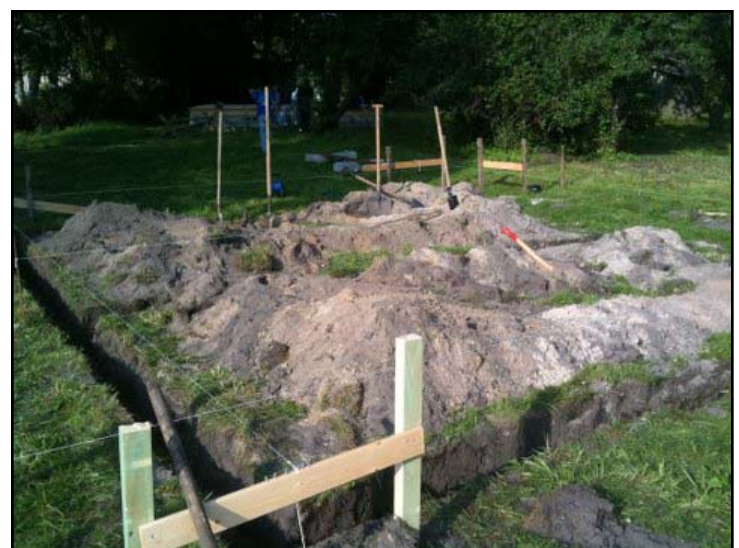
The financial report for the camp was presented with the Board expressing approval of the improved financial condition of the camp. This was a result of continued support of the camp by individuals and churches in the USA and by clearing up of a delay in transferring funds from GBGM.

Finally, the Board specifically expressed its deep appreciation to Hannah UMC of Gordo, AL, Christ Harbor UMC of Northport, AL, First UMC of Huntsville, AL and first UMC of Fayette, AL for their support of special projects at the camp.

This summer there were two VIM teams from the USA at Wesley Camp. Team one was led by Joe Acker and consisted of eight members. (See article on page 3). This team was at the camp for Wesley Days. In addition to helping prepare the camp for the upcoming camping season the team erected the first "tent platform." The platforms will eventually be converted into bunkhouses. (see pictures,)

The second team was led by Holt Cason from Tullahoma, TN. This team had five members and was sponsored by the FUMC of Tullahoma. Team members were Ali Helms, Jim McClure, and Holt Cason from Tullahoma and Ronnie Cason and Tommy Shirah from Cordeal, Ga. Joe Acker met this team in Riga and worked with them during their stay at Wesley Camp. This team accomplished two very important tasks. The first was to install the ceiling in the dining hall in the Alabama Building. The drop-in ceiling is similar to the one this team installed at Liepa Church last year but not quite as high. The new ceiling made a significant difference in how the room looked and created a sound barrier between the dining

hall and the auditorium just above it. The team was also successful in erecting the second tent platform. This platform will also become a bunkhouse in the future.

Each of the tent platforms cost approximately \$3,000 and funds for each were given by special mission offerings. The first was donated by Christ Harbor UMC in Northport, AL and the second was donated by Huntsville, AL FUMC.
